Springbrook Neighborhood and International District

McCament & Rogers was engaged by the City of Lakewood to gather input from residents, business owners, and other stakeholders about current issues of importance in the Springbrook neighborhood and the International District. The community outreach effort was scheduled to coincide with the city's 2016 public works and parks improvements being built in the Springbrook neighborhood and the International District on South Tacoma Way between Steilacoom Blvd. and 96th Street. The City anticipates using citizen input gathered through this community outreach effort to identify potential improvements that could be addressed in the city's 2017-2018 biennial budget and grant writing efforts.

Earlier this year McCament & Rogers drafted a two-page survey (Attachment 1) that was used to collect information in the Springbrook neighborhood and the International District where city public works improvements are currently in progress. The survey was posted on the City's website (<https://www.cityoflakewood.us/economic-development/data>) as well as being distributed to businesses, individuals, and community groups such as Springbrook Connect (SBC) and the Korean Women's Association (KWA). The survey was offered in English and Spanish, and a Korean translation is in progress. Roughly 300 surveys were distributed (Springbrook – 200; International District – 100). To date, sixty-five (65) survey responses have been received (Springbrook – 64; International District – 1). A detailed summary of responses for the Springbrook neighborhood is included with this memo (see Attachment 2).

Outreach Activities

From mid-April to mid-May, 2016, McCament & Rogers carried out a series of outreach activities centered around the use of a city-approved survey to provide the framework for community input about perceptions and experiences in the neighborhood or business location, desired public improvements, and preferences regarding modes of communication when the City is communicating with stakeholders.

Springbrook Neighborhood Outreach

- A personal visit was made to each business located on Bridgeport Way.
- Met with the property manager for each of the larger apartment complexes in the neighborhood.
- Met with a representative of Momentum Partners, a developer contemplating a 208 apartment development on 4.76 acres in the Springbrook neighborhood.
- Met with Don Meyer, Judy Sak, and Jennifer Pfeiffer of the JBLM's Housing Division.
- Provided surveys to JBLM's McChord Medical Center and Base Exchange.
- Worked closely with James Leet (President) and Jesse Black (VP) of Springbrook Connect (SBC) and Charles Ames, Pacific Neighborhood Association, to distribute and collect surveys for their constituencies as well as participating in several neighborhood meetings.
- Community Meetings & Events
 - April 15, 2016 – Set up an informational table at the NCO / Officer's Club at McChord to distribute the survey and promote the City of Lakewood's community outreach effort.
 - April 19, 2016 – Attended the Clover Park School District quarterly dinner held at Centerforce for Springbrook families to distribute the survey and collect responses.
 - May 14, 2016 – Attended the Springbrook Connect (SBC) meeting held at Centerforce. Distributed the survey and provided city-prepared information about current parks/public works projects for the Springbrook neighborhood (see Attachment 3).

International District

- A personal visit was made to the majority of businesses located on South Tacoma Way between Steilacoom Blvd. and 96th Street.
- Met with Sonnia Bradley, President, Korean Women's Association, and Lua Pritchard, Executive Director, Asian Pacific Cultural Center, to discuss the survey and identify a strategy to more effectively collect survey responses. Ms. Bradley volunteered to provide a Korean translation of the survey. Ms. Bradley is traveling and our conversation will be renewed when she returns in late June.

Key Observations

Springbrook Neighborhood

The Springbrook neighborhood has a vibrant core of volunteers that are working hard to clean up the neighborhood, advocate for city and school district improvements and services, and nurture a growing sense of community and community pride. The Springbrook Connection (SBC) is an active volunteer organization in the neighborhood with strong grass roots support at this time in their evolution.

JBLM is a good partner for the city and is concerned with neighborhoods and business districts where military personnel and civilians associated with JBLM will live and shop. Following an on-base meeting with representatives from JBLM's Residential Communities Division, and in preparation for responding to the city's survey, two employees from JBLM's Housing Services Office drove each street in the Springbrook neighborhood and provided us with on-line crime reports for the neighborhood. The on-line reports provide a snapshot of 1-day / 1 week / and 1 month crime maps within Springbrook, including the location of a registered sex offender residing not far from Springbrook Park (see Attachment 5).

Key observations from survey responses include the following summations:

- Crime, drugs, panhandlers, slum landlords, ill-managed apartment properties, a growing homeless population and garbage and littering were the overriding concerns of the neighborhood in the area of public health and safety.
- The lack of jobs in the neighborhood and no access to public transit to commute to work are keenly felt by neighborhood residents who do not own their own transportation or are living on a fixed income.
- Sidewalks, safe crosswalks, lighting, and stormwater improvements on Bridgeport Way and side streets was most often voiced as the desired public works amenity for the neighborhood.
- The improvements at Springbrook Park are eagerly awaited by residents, and a desire for park programming and park supervision were brought up by a number of respondents.
- Out of a pool of 64 respondents, 37 survey takers indicated they either would be or might be interested in volunteering in their neighborhood – 6/37 indicated they were already volunteers, 11/37 indicated ‘maybe’ and the remaining 21/37 respondents said ‘yes.’ (See Attachment 6.)
- Businesses, organizations and services suggested as desirable for the Springbrook neighborhood include an employment agency, childcare center, tutoring program, Head Start program, school programs, Neighborhood Watch program, Boy and Girl Scouts troops, and mainstream grocery store.
- Almost half of Springbrook respondents were aware of the City’s street repair and park improvements slated for 2016 and community meetings and the City’s newsletter, ‘Connections’ were the primary sources of information.
- A number of Springbrook residents and business owners were pleased the City was reaching out to the community to provide information and ask for their opinions and suggestions for neighborhood improvements. Several members of Springbrook Connect had kind words for Mary Dodsworth with the city’s Parks, Recreation and Community Services division and the enthusiastic and responsive leadership she is providing for the planning, design and upcoming construction of park improvements.
- The top four methods of city communication preferred by Springbrook respondents were in order of preference: mailings (30%), emails (18%), neighborhood meetings (16%), and the city’s newsletter, ‘Connections’ (15%).

International District

Business owners and employees working in the International District appear to have a cohesive community based on a shared ethnic heritage. Working through the Korean Women’s Association (KWA) seems to be key to community outreach in this area of the city.

Conclusions and Recommendations

1. Continued coordination and on-the-ground community policing by law enforcement personnel.
2. Enforcement of building regulations to clean up slum properties and damaged properties such as the Eastwood Apartments damaged by fires in January and April, 2016.
3. Improved garbage service and availability of trash cans and recycling containers in the neighborhood.
4. Pave side streets, improve pedestrian crossings, and provide more lighting on Bridgeport Way and side streets to address safety issues.
5. Consider a thoughtful and well executed effort to match and train neighborhood volunteers with existing or new volunteer programs and activities to benefit the Springbrook neighborhood and the International District.

Bridgeport Way SW JBLM to I-5

Project Description

Through this project, the City will construct curb, gutter and 6 foot wide sidewalk along both sides of Bridgeport Way SW starting at McChord Drive SW extending north to the south end of the Interstate 5 overpass; install a 5 foot wide bicycle lane; install a new storm water conveyance and quality system; install a new LED roadway illumination system; upgrade the signals at the intersections of both San Francisco Avenue SW and the north bound I-5 on/off ramps to meet current pedestrian crossing standards; and overlay the roadway. In addition to the roadway work, the Lakewood Water District will replace their water main between San Francisco Avenue SW and 123rd Street SW.

Schedule

Construction is scheduled to begin early April, 2016 and is expected to last approximately 6 months depending on weather. Typical working hours will be between the hours of 7 AM and 5 PM. There will be occasions that work will occur during night time hours or weekends to minimize disruption.

Traffic Impacts

It is anticipated that Bridgeport Way SW will be limited to one lane of traffic in each direction of travel. Patrons conducting business and residents within the project area will be allowed access at all times but should expect delays. Work which requires the closure of more than one lane in each direction will be done during night time hours. The City will provide police patrol in the project area as necessary to ensure safe work zones and travel routes.

Springbrook Park and Connector Bridge

We plan to demolish the houses and outbuildings on the site (we have to do a cultural survey first). Then we will relocate the fences and open up the park so there is 5+ acres of open space. 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
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
